POINTS

Points awarded in each class:

First Red ribbon..... 3 points
Second..... Blue ribbon 2 points
Third..... White ribbon 1 point

Points awarded for collections, display, arrangements & baskets:

First Red Ribbon 5 points
Second..... Blue Ribbon 3 points
Third..... White Ribbon 2 points

In each section, there is an Aggregate Award to the exhibitor who scores the most points. The judge will also choose a Champion, the best exhibit in each section. A rosette and prize award are awarded to the exhibitor.

The Grand Aggregate will be awarded to the exhibitor who earns the highest total points in the show. In the event of a tie, the person with the most first place ribbons will be awarded the Grand Aggregate. Rosette donated by Alberta Horticultural Association and Prize will be awarded.

RULES & REGULATIONS

1. Competitions as listed are open to all.
2. An exhibitor may make **any number** of entries in each class, provided they are distinct and separate named varieties. The only exceptions to this rule are in the Decorative Arrangements where only **one entry** is permitted in each class. A maximum of **two entries** are permitted in Photography classes, Indoor Potted Plants and Outdoor Potted Plants.
3. Junior classes are open to children 14 years of age and under. More than one member of a family is eligible to enter in each Junior Class. Juniors may enter Adult Classes not listed in Junior Classes. Any age is welcome to enter Open Adult classes.
4. Any members of the same family may exhibit from the same garden, provided that they are distinct and separate named varieties. Each exhibit must be entered under one name only.
5. Novice: A competitor who has not won a prize ribbon at a previous show.
6. Entry tags are provided by the Garden Club. All exhibitors will attach a tag to their entries. Must show class number. If possible, name your variety. This is most helpful to the viewers and creates a lot of interest as it gives people an idea of what types and varieties grow best in this locality. Naming of varieties could give one extra point. In the event of a tie in judging, consideration will be given to the exhibit that is correctly named.
7. Indoor and outdoor potted plants must be grown at the home of the exhibitor for a minimum of 2 months before date of show.
8. All exhibits in Adult classes must be grown by the exhibitor, except for Decorative Arrangements. Material used in Decorative Arrangements may be obtained from any source. e.g. Flower shops
9. All flowers may be shown in receptacles of the exhibitor's choice unless stated otherwise.
10. Accessories may be used with any Decorative Arrangements and Bouquets arrangements, but must be an integral part of the design. e.g. beads, figurines, candles, doilies
11. Wiring of flowers is accepted in the Decorative Classes only.
12. The Club will not be responsible for personal injury, breakage, damage or loss.
13. The judge's decisions shall be final. Judges are not obliged to award any prize unless exhibit merits one.
14. The Show Committee is responsible for ensuring that all regulations are adhered to by the exhibitor.
15. Exhibits are closed while judging takes place.
16. The judges, certified by the Alberta Horticultural Association, will make their decisions based on the show guide rules and regulations. It is important, then, that each exhibitor becomes familiar with the rules and regulations of the prize list. It is also very important that exhibitors take particular interest in details in each class in which they intend to enter.
17. No entries will be accepted after 9:30am

HINTS TO ASSIST IN STAGING EXHIBITS

- Go to www.reddeergardenclub.ca Flower Show/Hints and Tips for more details.
- Specimens should be as uniform as possible in color, maturity, shape and size. If diameter or any size is specified, be sure to measure.
- All exhibits must be clean and free of all insects and disease.
- Watch for proper maturity, not over, or under mature. Refer to the booklet Judging Standards for Horticultural Shows for specifics. The club has copies to lend out.
- The booklet Judging Standards for Horticultural Shows (Agdex 200/47) is available at Alberta Agriculture, Food and Rural Development, Publication Office, 7000 - 113 Street, Edmonton, Alberta, T6H 5T6. 1-800-292-5697

- An Arrangement has composition of color, size and shape to produce a pleasing effect. Each unit (flower, fruit, vegetable, etc.) is placed so that collectively they produce a design.
- A Bouquet or Vase is a collection of favorite flowers in a container or vase, but neither arranged nor with the stems tied together.
- A Collection is a group of as many different kinds or cultivars as may be possible without sacrificing quality and appearance (unless otherwise specified in the show guide).
- 5 cm = 2" 10 cm = 4" 15 cm = 6" 20 cm = 8"

When judging cut flowers, the following qualities are considered:

<i>Condition:</i>	Includes uniformity, substance, free from bruise and blemish
<i>Form:</i>	Includes uniformity, proper maturity, shape and petal age
<i>Stem & Foliage:</i>	Includes uniformity, strength and/or straightness, foliage quality, size and proportion
<i>Color:</i>	Includes uniformity, intensity, clarity and brilliance
<i>Size:</i>	Includes uniformity and proper size for variety

- All flowers to be in one container, unless stated otherwise. Begonias, clematis, marigolds, nasturtiums, pansies, and petunias are to be displayed in flat, shallow container covered with foil.
- Flowers can be conditioned by immersing their stems into warm water immediately upon cutting, preferably early morning or evening. Store flowers in a cool dark place till water has cooled or overnight if possible. Re-cut the stem ends before displaying or arranging.

DAHLIAS

- The first set of leaves beneath the flower head should be attached to the stem (but no buds or obvious sign of disbudding). Stems should be long enough to support bloom well above top of vase or bottle.

DECORATIVE ARRANGEMENTS & BOUQUETS

Section 6

TIPS FOR EXHIBITORS:

- Judges will be looking for Arrangements that create a Decorative Design and best conform to the Class Description. Any foliage can be used.
- ‘Oasis’ and other material or articles for holding the stems in place is permitted but should not be obvious or detract from the appearance of the arrangement.
- Containers and accessories are a key element of all arrangements, and are to be provided by the Exhibitor, e.g. mirrors, ornaments, beads, etc.

- 600 *Keen on Green* -- foliage only
- 601 *Tone on Tone* -- shades of one color, includes container and flowers, foliage allowed
- 602 *Attic Treasures* -- including old-fashioned items
- 603 *One and Only* -- designed, using a single flower
- 604 *Short and Sweet* -- miniature, not over 7.5cm (3”), fresh material
- 605 *Thumbelina* -- miniature, not over 7.5cm (3”), dried material
- 606 *Tri Tri Again* -- designed using 3 blooms only
- 607 *What’s for supper?* -- Incorporate a kitchen gadget
- 608 *Gone to Seed* -- fresh material
- 609 *Towering Splendor* -- tall and modern floral design
- 610 *Storytime* -- floral design depicting the title of a song, book or movie, named
- 611 *Reflections* -- floral design using mirror(s) as accessories
- 612 *Designer’s Choice* -- decorative design of flowers
- 613 *Tea for Two* -- cup and saucer arrangement – dainty design
- 614 *Nightlight* -- floral design using candle(s)
- 615 *Little Critter* -- object or critter made from vegetables, fruits or flowers, etc. free standing
- 616 *New Beginnings* -- Novice Arrangement, First time exhibitor

CULTIVATED FRUITS

Section 7

- Variety named, if known
- Fruits to be displayed on paper plate
